POUGHKEEPSIE, June 27.—A wedding which brought many well-known New Yorkers to Millbrook to-day was that of Miss Charlotte Pearsall Thorne, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Oakleigh Thorne, and Birdseye Blakeman Lewis of New York, a grandson of Mr. Blakeman, member of one of the old publishing firms of that city. The Thorne family home has been located at Millbrook since the eighteenth century, and general interest was taken all through the countryside in the event.

A special train brought up several hundred guests from New York. The ceremony was performed in Grace Church.

It was a yellow and white wedding—the old "Thorndale" colors.

The bridesmaids were the Misses Catherine Burton, Margaret French, Frances Cleveland Lamont, Edith Rossiter, Dorothy Schoonmaker, and May Wetherbee, and the maid of honor was the bride's sister, Miss Margaret Hayes Thorne.

The church was festooned in green, brightened by bouquets of yellow and white field flowers, tied with white ribbons. The chancel was banked with laurel and the altar was covered with white roses.

The bride's wedding gown was of white satin. She wore her mother's wedding veil of tulle, the centre panel of which was the point lace veil worn by her grandmother at her wedding. She carried white orchids and lilies of the valley.

The wedding ceremony took place at 12:30 P. M. The bride was given in marriage by her father. The best man was Stephen Peabody, Jr., of New York, and the ushers were Fred Blakeman, Thomas Blakeman, cousins of the bridegroom; Harold Jones, John D. Wing, 2d, Carroll Robertson, all of New York, and Kenyon Bolton of Cleveland, Ohio.

The Rev. William C. Rogers of St. Agnes Church, New York, officiated, assisted by the Rev. Charles Kendall Gilbert, rector of Grace Church, Millbrook.
